

What is the Community and Police Partnership?

The Community and Police Partnership (CPP for short) consists of people drawn from the local community and the Police. It includes representatives of Police Liaison Groups, Neighbourhood Watch, Residents' Associations, Victim Support, Probation, Crown Prosecution Service, Ethnic Minorities Advocacy Group (EMAG), Richmond Churches and Safer Neighbourhood Teams along with a number of voluntary groups and agencies. The Council's Community Safety Partnership, Environmental Planning and Review and Environmental and Operational Services are also represented.

The CPP is independent of both the Police and the Council. We represent the authentic and informed voice of local people about policing matters.

The CPP welcomes participation from all faith groups, senior citizens and young people... in fact, from all members of the community. This could be YOU... or one of your family, a friend or a neighbour.

The Role of the CPP in the Community

Effective policing can only be achieved with the consent and co-operation of the public. The CPP encourages communication between the Police and the community in order to develop a mutual understanding of their concerns and priorities. The CPP discusses aspects of policing which concern YOU, the residents of Richmond upon Thames.
