2	Minutes of 28 May 2010 meeting and Matters Arising	
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The minutes for 28th May were agreed • AL has been given one Operation Fairway DVD but needs more. The Councillors' counter terrorism briefing has taken place. 	
3	Short presentations	
3.1	<p>Operation Lockout – Kevin Fletcher-Biles</p> <p>KFB's presentation was sent to the group prior to the meeting. He made some additional points. Pedal cycle theft has strong links to other crime, for example bikes used as transport away from the scene of crime. One way to reduce our Total Notifiable Offences (TNOs) is to reduce pedal cycle theft.</p> <p>A lot of Operation Lockout (OL) work aims to reduce complacency by residents which can leave them open to crime. All victims receive a target-hardening pack.</p>	

	<p>Six police personnel are now trained as emergency lockfitters. Intensive house to house visits have been conducted in the five areas of relative deprivation where levels of public satisfaction were below the threshold. The public satisfaction levels in these areas have now increased.</p> <p>He has produced a new set of six leaflets about a family called “the Richmonds” which focus on sheds, satnav, car keys fished through letter boxes, personal safety, cycle theft and security measures when you’re away from home.</p> <p>He has attended 14 community events with the van and marquee since April. Latest results for the project are a continuing fall in residential burglary (6.6% reduction 2009-10). Around 35% pedal cycles in the borough are estimated to have been property marked.</p> <p>Questions and comments: JD suggests a revised letter in the burglary pack when Clive Chalk takes up the Borough Commander post. He believes that bike marking will help enormously with meeting the new MPS 10% reduction target for TNOs.</p> <p>AL commented that other boroughs are approaching us to copy the OL branding e.g. Harrow. The group felt it is good to share good practice. We should copyright the work but not sell it.</p>	
3.2	<p>Reducing Offending (interim report) – Catherine Askew CA2 tabled copies of an evaluation report of the Diamond initiative. She is rescheduling a meeting with the Police to discuss sharing data. JD suggested an initial meeting before mid-August.</p> <p>London has a better rate of reduced reoffending than elsewhere in the UK. CA2 has been looking at boroughs where the reductions are statistically significant (Wandsworth, Lambeth, Southwark) to see what worked well and to help us work out with Partners who is reoffending in the borough and why. There are numerous models being trialled, for example aligning burglars into PPO and initiatives aimed at female offenders who end up in custody due to missing their court dates repeatedly, the integrated offender management model in Lambeth and the Borough Intelligence Unit information collation work in Southwark for gang members.</p>	
4	Performance	
4.1	<p>Drug Performance – Nourieh Hoveyda NH stepped in to report on drug performance for which the final data will be released in August/September. AL commented that there are several changes afoot. There will be a refresh on estimates so we should finally get a different target next year. The new government Drugs Strategy is due in December and the new Council is also running a scrutiny on the subject. Early indications are that targets will be lifted with more local control.</p>	
4.s	<p>iQuanta report update – Sharon Dewar For overall performance, we are 2nd safest London borough for quarterly figures but 1st for the rolling 12 month figure. We are well ahead of target for NI16 Serious Acquisitive Crime but the NI20 Assault with Injury rate is not on target despite being the lowest rate in London. JD commented that the Police are doing a lot of work around <u>where</u> crimes are committed, and are increasing the focus on the town centre night time economy. For example, they have appointed a second Licensing Officer.</p>	

	<p>NI21 is measured by the Place Survey which will not now be repeated in 2010. GN said we need to find another way to measure how residents feel about crime. JD said the Police can now obtain data on repeat callers and the SNTs are contacting repeat callers who stopped calling to find out if this was due to their issue being resolved. Informal feedback from SNT sergeants is that people are impressed by being cold-called. The Council will be surveying residents in October as part of its All in One policy initiative; it was unlikely to use Place Survey questions.</p>	
<p>4.3</p>	<p>Work plan updates (quarter one) – Natasha Allen Offender Management Group: CA2 said they are no longer reporting back on NI30 as it is not wanted.</p> <p>Communications Group: the requested audit of community engagement cannot be done because key Partnership members cannot attend the meetings.</p> <p>Anti-social Behaviour Development Group: GN recommends that groups press ahead with doing what is important locally rather than waiting for guidance from the new government. The first stand-alone ASBO for some time is being sought.</p> <p>Tension Monitoring Group: will be working on the forthcoming papal visit. Police planning is being done centrally.</p> <p>Domestic Abuse Forum: has a new Chair Liz Dewson. Subgroups have been streamlined from 4 to 2. A recent emergency MARAC meeting was a positive example of partnership working in which the Police and Victim Support worked well together. Appointment of the 2nd IDVA is now progressing.</p> <p>Counter Terrorism (CT) Plan: the demise of the GOL CT network has left a bit of a vacuum. Officers will consequently meet with colleagues in neighbouring boroughs more often. There is police unease about the effect of budget cuts on CT work.</p>	
<p>4.4</p>	<p>Exception reports from task groups – Natasha Allen The Exception Reports were circulated in advance of the meeting. Some additional points were made.</p> <p>MAPPA: fine and working well. The dangerous person is doing well and being closely monitored in his hostel.</p> <p>YOT: was recently awarded an excellent rating. GN said well done to everybody. The concerns regarding increasing solvent abuse are being dealt with in a well-coordinated manner.</p> <p>Stop & Search Group: CA1 will attend an emergency MPA meeting for S&S chairs to discuss the European Court of Human Rights decision on Section 44. There are concerns about how to do searches of suspect vehicles. Action: JD will ask Tom Knox to do a briefing note.</p> <p>DAF & DAF sub-groups: LP reported appointment of a further outreach post at a 4th Children's Centre.</p> <p>Hate Crime Forum: Stop Hate UK will be launched soon.</p>	
<p>5</p>	<p>PVE Funding Bids – Anne Lawtey</p>	

	£35k was set aside and the Contest steering group has made recommendations on the five applications made. The group agreed to endorse these.	
6	Matters arising	
6.1	<p>LCRB feedback response – Anne Lawtey</p> <p>There is concern about how well the proposed Board can encompass the existing functions of the London Criminal Justice Partnership and the London Community Safety Partnership. The current membership proposals do not reflect several key responsible authorities such as Fire, Health and Probation. We must also be aware that the proposed Strategic Assessment for London may overlook key concerns in our low crime borough.</p> <p>TK said that the GLA is working with the boroughs on this and have said they want a good mix of low and high crime and inner and outer boroughs. She also knows they are meeting with Probation and are looking at links with Health and the voluntary sector.</p>	
7	Any Other Business	
	<p>NA mentioned that Stakeholder event has received very positive feedback. Face the People is coming up on 28/9. CA1 said the CPP is going to publicise it more widely e.g. via A5 posters at stations and Facebook. CA2 will give a presentation at this event</p> <p>LP reported that Victim Support's admin is moving to Wandsworth to provide a better 9-5 constant service. For Richmond victims the service itself will still be provided in Richmond.</p>
