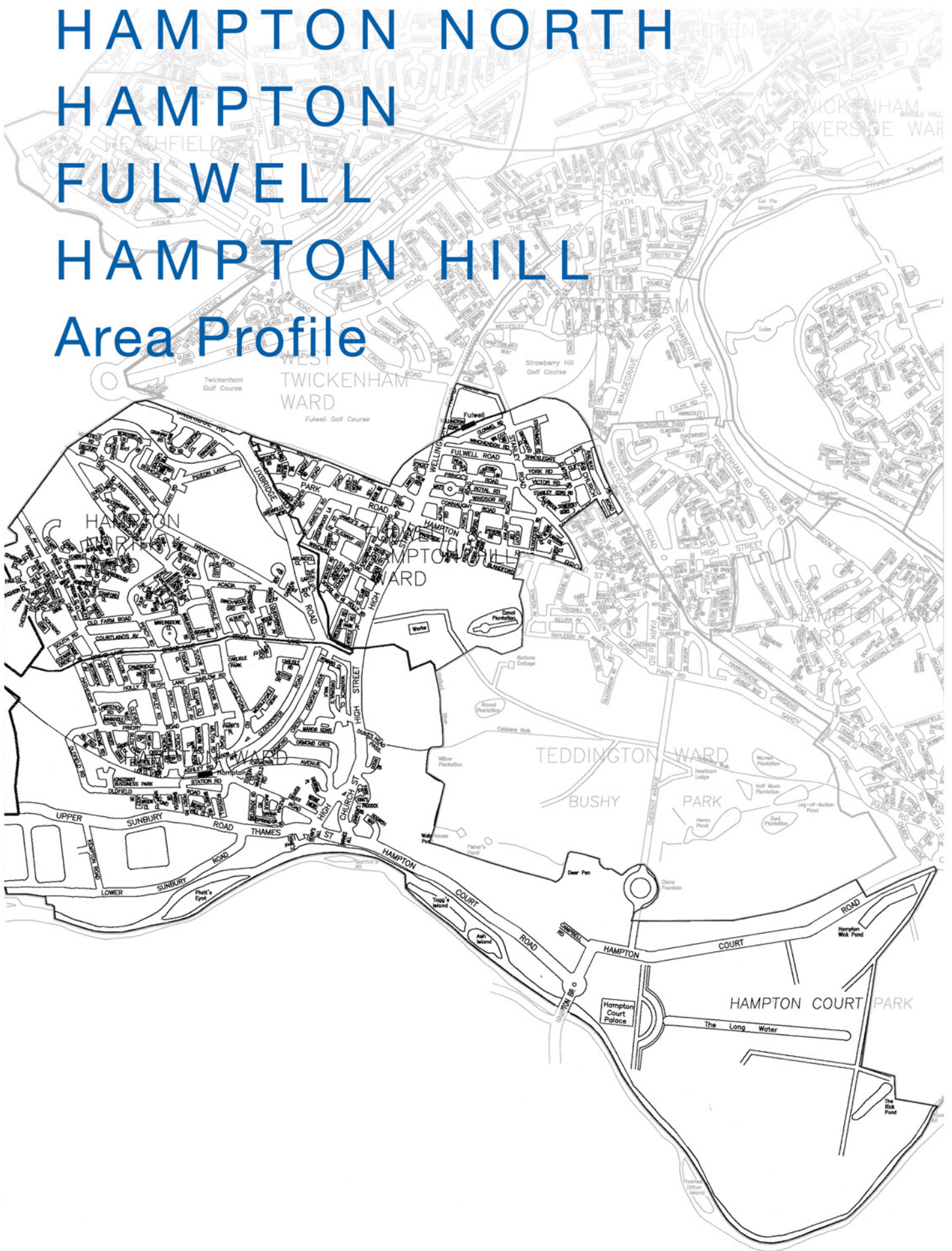

Household type

34% of households are one-person households. Within this category, about 40% are pensioners living alone, and represent 13.7% of all households. This proportion is line with the borough (13.8%) and England & Wales average (14.4%).

5.2% of households consist of lone parent households, slightly above the borough average (4.3%) but below the England & Wales average (6.5%).

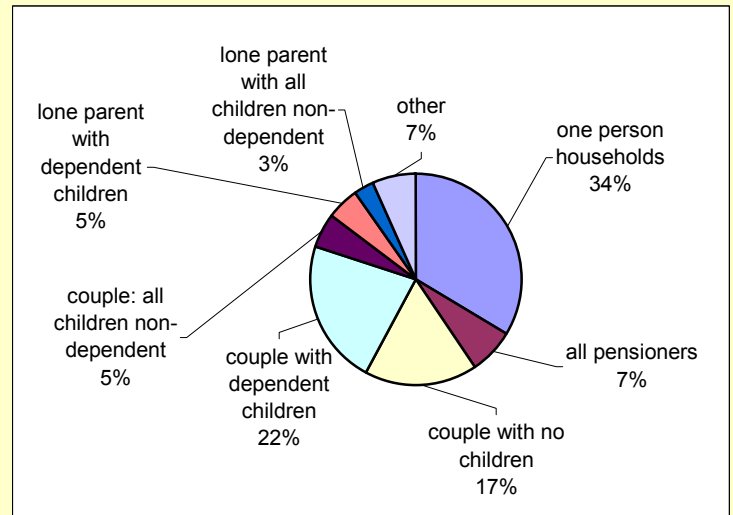

Approximately 28,000 people lived in the area in 2001, which is a combination of three electoral wards.

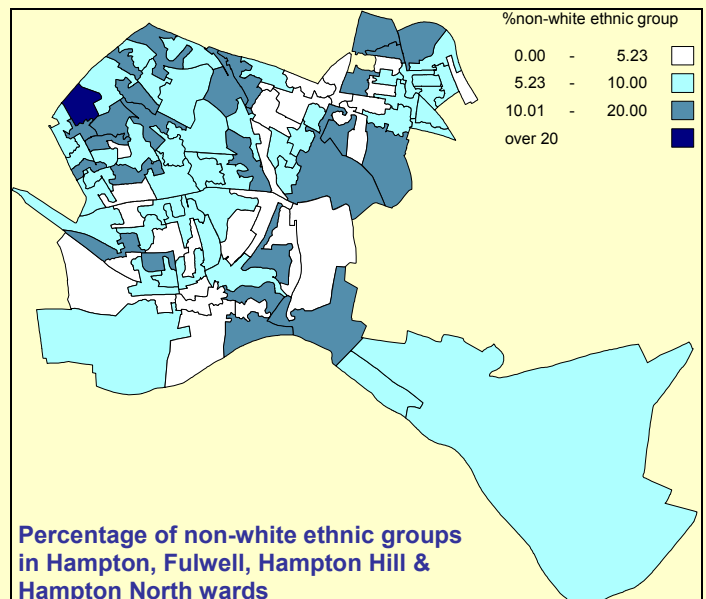
1 in 5 residents are aged 15 or under, in line with the national average (20.2%) and slightly above the borough average of 18.8%. 14% are over 65 which is equivalent to the borough average.

Estimates produced by the Greater London Authority suggest that the resident population is set to rise by approximately 4% by 2006.

According to the 2001 Census of Population there were 12127 households. GLA estimates (2003 round – Scenario 8.1) indicate that this figure is due to rise to 12395 by 2006.

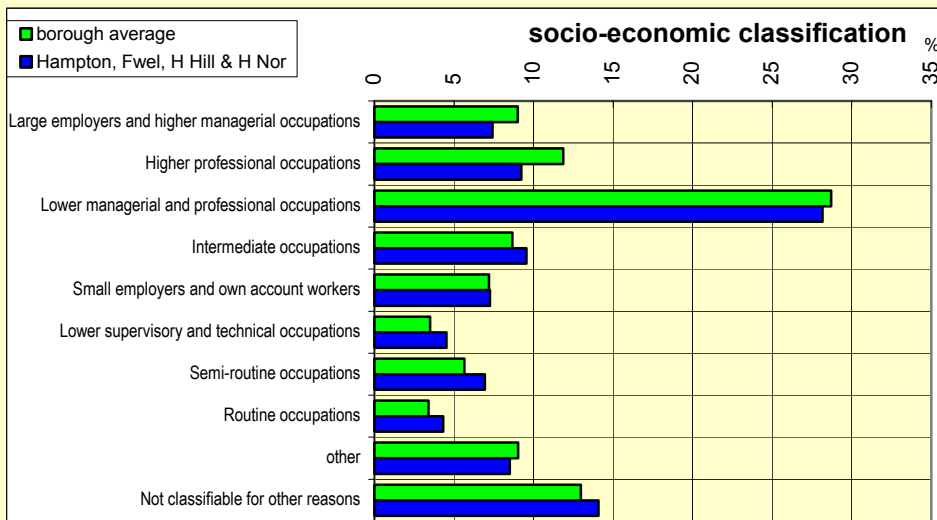

8% of residents are from non-white minority ethnic groups which is slightly below the borough average of 9%. This area has the highest proportion of “White British” residents of any of the consultation areas. The Irish are the largest ethnic group. At this level, there does not appear to be a clustering of any specific ethnic group. However, analysis at Output Area level (the smallest geographical level in the Census) reveals some differences between the areas, with some clustering particularly in Hampton North. In one Output Area (dark shading on map) 20% of residents are from non-white ethnic minority groups.

Quick stats from the 2001 Census:

- 21% of households do not have a car/van, which is amongst the lowest (borough average of 24%). Approximately half have one car/van (borough average 49.5%).
- 72% of households are owner occupiers (including those buying with a mortgage), which is slightly above the borough average of 69%. On Census Day 2001 14% of households rented their accommodation either from the Local Authority or a Housing Association (HA)/ Registered Social Landlord (RSL). This figure is slightly above the borough average (11.7%) but conceals differences between the wards. Almost 20% of residents in Hampton North ward rented from a local authority/ HA or RSL, whereas the figure is only 9% for Fulwell & Hampton Hill.
- The area has a higher than average proportion (16.7%) of residents aged 16-74 who do not have any qualifications (borough average of 13.6%). 1 in 5 of those living in Hampton North ward do not have any qualifications. However, this figure is still well below the England & Wales average of 29%.
- 36% of people in the same age group have attained the highest qualification level¹, which is well below the borough average of 45%, but again significantly higher than the England & Wales average of only 20%. Residents of Hampton North ward are much less likely to have attained this qualification level (29%), than those living in the other wards in the area. In fact only Whitton & Heathfield wards had a lower percentage.
- 3,669 or 13% of people living in the area have a limiting long-term illness, of which 44% (1614 people) are of working age (16-74 yrs). Although the proportion of people with a LLTI is not significantly higher than the borough average of 12%, the picture in Hampton North is slightly different where 15% have a LLTI. This is the highest amongst all wards in the borough with the exception of Heathfield and Ham, Petersham & Richmond Riverside wards.
- 75% of residents said their health was “good”, 19% that it was “fairly good” and 6% that it was “not good”.

Socio-economic classification



The area has a lower proportion of residents classed in the “higher professional and managerial occupations” category than the borough average. It has more people working in the lower skilled jobs and routine occupations category.

NS-SeC is the National Statistics Socio-Economic Classification providing an indication of socio-economic position, based on occupation.

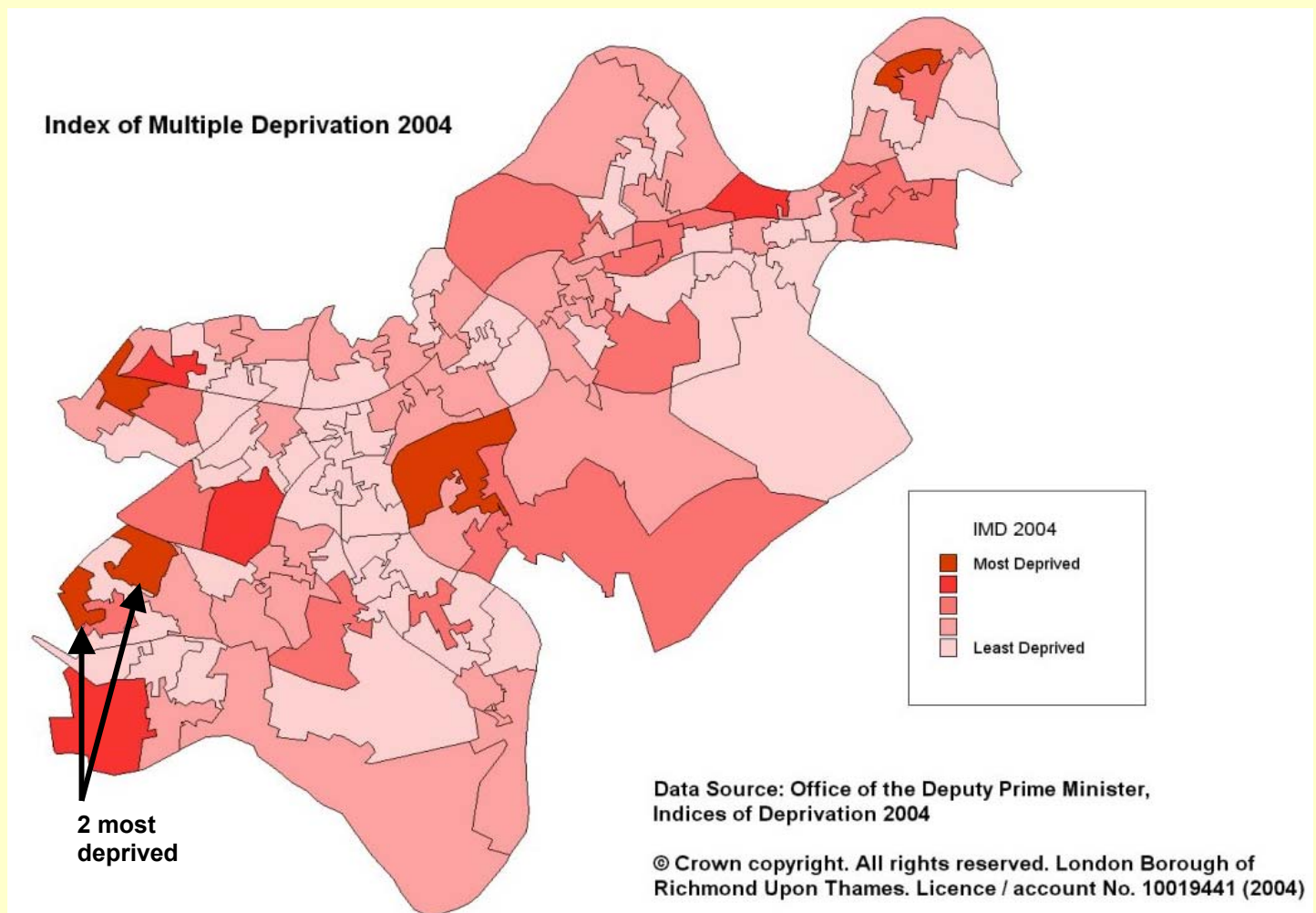
Richmond upon Thames had the 6th highest mean household income (£44,006) in 2004 amongst local authorities in Great Britain.

Using this measure of income, data suggest that income levels vary between the wards. Hampton North has a lower figure, but is not significantly low on a London-wide scale.

Deprivation

The ODPM's Index of Multiple Deprivation 2004 has been analysed at ward level by the GLA (excluding City of London).

None of the wards have Super Output Areas⁴ which are amongst the 30% most deprived in the country. Although not deprived in a national or regional sense, these wards contains areas which are amongst the most deprived in the borough (identified on the map below with darker shading). The 2 SOA areas in question are ranked 10,680 & 10,682 out of 32,482 in England, where 1 is the most deprived, and 32,482 is the least deprived.
