The project will include trips to places of interest, a residential weekend, art, drama and much more.</p> <p>The BME project will support and reach out to adult black and minority ethnic carers who have difficulty accessing appropriate mainstream services. We work with groups and individuals, providing breaks, advocacy, securing benefits/grants and encouraging and enabling people to access the support services they/the person they are caring for need. We will provide for individuals and groups including day trips , fitness clubs, cultural events, seminars and information sessions.</p> <p>The Primary Care project will visit each GP practice in the borough at least 5 times to distribute information on services available to carers, to liaise with practice staff and encourage them to identify carers and refer them to RCC /LBRuT/Voluntary Agencies for further support should they require it. This post holder also co ordinates our Carers Training Programme which covers all the issues and challenges (both practical and emotional) that carers face</p> <p>The generic Carers Support project provides a carers support phone line, one to one counselling and benefits advice. We also conduct home visits and see people at the centre. We also organise breaks for adult carers, group and individual activities such as art therapy or yoga and co ordinate a complimentary therapies service and counselling provided by trained practitioners.</p>

Caring Café supporting up to 40 individuals living with dementia. Carers/cared-for, most aged 65+, enjoy respite in a safe, welcoming environment; they benefit from carer/ex-carer support groups, informal advice, making friends and share experience/expertise with other carers, all of which enhance these carers' quality of life and mental/physical well-being; some use opportunity to enjoy alone. 2. Saturday Clubs Hampton and Barnes/Mortlake Support for parent-carers and working parent-carers of 42 children with special needs, most from financially/social deprived backgrounds, exposed to domestic violence, neglect or abuse. Children explore stimulating play/sport, make friends, enjoy wholesome food and discover healthy eating. The project has 5 main work objectives in order to achieve its aim.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Objective 1: To increase awareness of the services available to MH Carers. The project aims to increase awareness of the services available and increase the number of MH Carers registered with the project. Objective 2: To offer information, education and training. A primary focus for the project is to develop information resources and training of a high standard, recognising the importance of developing carer's skills and understanding, not just for the carer - but also to aid the recovery of the person with mental health problems. ➤ Objective 3: To offer a range of support services MH Carers frequently experience stigma and social isolation and often have high levels of anxiety, stress and depression. A range of support services is provided including social activities, complementary therapies, support groups, counselling, one to one advice and guidance and telephone support. ➤ Objective 4: To promote, support and empower families and friends for them to become increasingly involved with the development of services. Richmond Mind aims to increase the involvement of mental health service users in the continuing development mental health services. ➤ Objective 5: To work in partnership with statutory and voluntary sector partners to increase awareness of the needs of MH Carers and to improve services available to them. 				

	The project also recognises the importance of maintaining strong links and continues to develop multiagency approaches with statutory and voluntary organisations at a local level.
