## SUMMARY

As part of the Council's continued commitment to improve our parks and open spaces, we are proposing to create an additional football pitch in Hatherop Park to accommodate and grow girls' football in the borough. Women's football is a fast-growing sport internationally.

We would like to be able to provide sport opportunities for all and we recognise the health benefits sport can bring to individuals and the community. However, the current football facilities are not sufficient to accommodate additional new teams. The proposed new pitch would allow for additional teams to be developed, as well as protecting existing pitches from overuse, thereby helping to protecting this green flag award winning park for the future.

# 1. Background

Currently, football clubs use portable goals to ensure the park is not dominated by football pitches. The pitches are situated as far away from Hatherop Road as possible to minimise any effects on local residents and consideration is given to park users and dog walkers to ensure they are not restricted on entry to the park. An indicative map showing the proposed location of the new pitch can be viewed <u>here</u>.

Football sessions are held on Sunday mornings and only during the football season (August to April). If the proposals are supported, the pitches would be prepared in time for next season 2021/22. Sports clubs would also be encouraged to promote sustainable travel or car shares to and from the park to ease the pressures of parking on adjacent roads.

## 5. Consultation. (optional section- as appropriate)

A public consultation was carried out between the 18<sup>th</sup> of September and the 16<sup>th</sup> of October. The results are as follows:

- 116 people took part with 85 out of 116 either agreeing or strongly agreeing with the proposal (73%)
- 29 (25%) respondents either disagreeing or strongly disagreeing with the proposal.

Concerns were raised about the risk of more cars parking on adjacent roads due to the increase in parks users and the pressures that this will bring. Others were worried that a new pitch would reduce the amount of open space for other park users. To combat these concerns, the goal post will be removeable and the pitches only used on Sunday's between August and May each year and the clubs and their members will be encouraged to travel sustainably to reduce the need for parking. Double yellow lines outside the park entrance will be remewed to prevent any anti-social parking.
