Comments: With a number of schools dealing with their own in year admissions, we are unable to confirm that we are fully aware of all children who may be missing education if they are not within our radar.

For purposes of safeguarding children and ensuring that the LA is able to properly identify children missing education (who may have applied directly to a school only), it would be better for all applications for schools in its area to be made via the LA so that there is a consistent and definite way of case managing children without a school place into a placement. This would also help parents who may not be familiar with schools or the variations in in year application process if they have to apply to some schools directly and not others. This will also help identify any children who may be school hopping

and families who may require support to manage situatons for which changing schools may not be the solution

Comments: Parental expectations have been confused and misguided by the open letter sent by a minister in September 2015. This has led to subjective judgements of parents being put up against the professional views of Early Years practioners and Head teachers whose experience, of dealing with the development of children over time and across many settings, has been repeatedly challenged when requests have ben refused.

By creating the expectation that requests should be agreed without any evidence of need being provided, the government has not considered the impact on teaching and learning in the classroom of having a potential of up to 18 months difference in age range; the impact on school place planning, resourcing in schools and social development of children.

Comments: It would be better to leave the final decision to allow the request to rest with the Headteacher to ensure consistency
