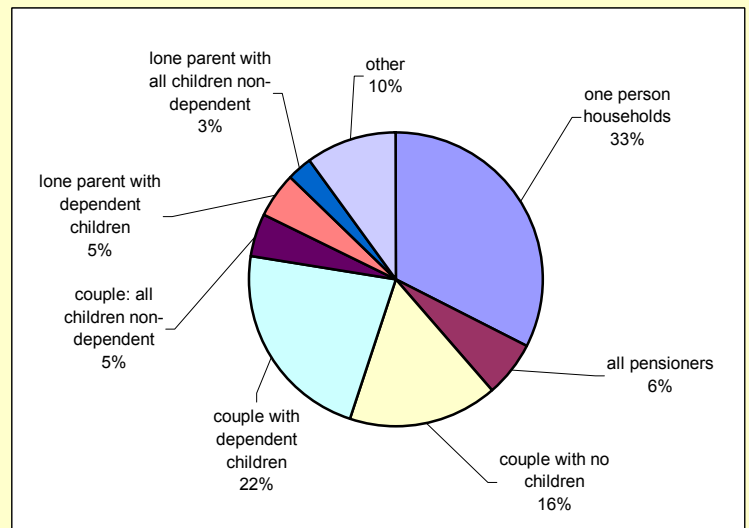
Household type

A third of all households in Barnes are 1 person households. Of these 13% are lone pensioner households, a similar proportion to the borough average, but slightly below that for England & Wales (14.4%). 5% of households are lone parent households with dependent children, a higher proportion than the Borough average (4.3%) no doubt reflect the age structure of the ward, but lower than the England & Wales average (6.5%)

The average age of a Barnes resident in 2001 was 37.3, a year younger than the borough and England & Wales total. The proportion of those aged under 16 (21.2%) is more in line with the England & Wales average (20.2%) than the borough average of 18.8%.

Estimates produced by the Greater London Authority suggest that the resident population of Barnes is set to rise by approximately 4% by 2006. The number of very young children is likely to fall slightly, as are the number of 30-44 year olds and over 75s. The number of 20-24 year olds is set to rise.

According to the 2001 Census of Population there were 4,137 households in Barnes. GLA estimates (2003 round – Scenario 8.1) indicate that this figure is due to rise to 4,229 by 2006.

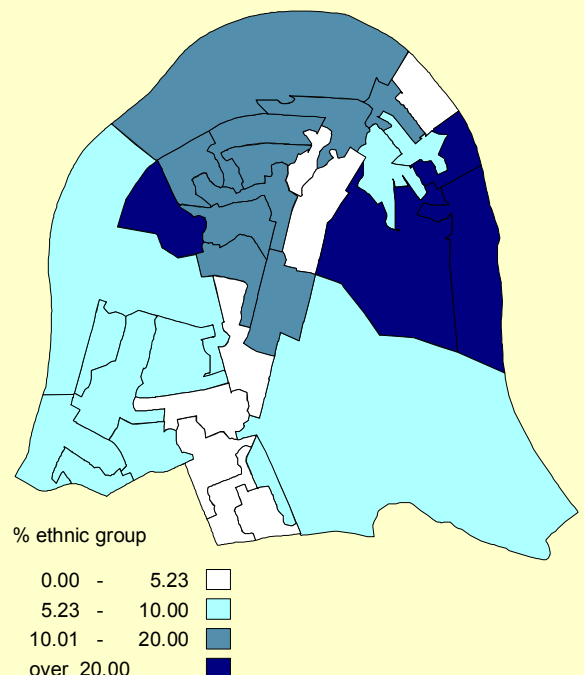

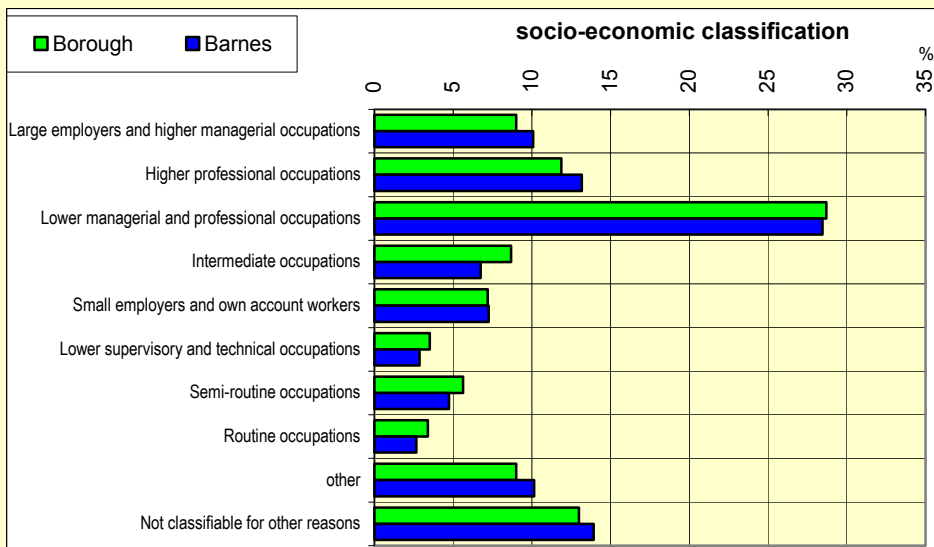
Just less than 10% of Barnes residents are from non-white ethnic groups, which is similar to the Borough as a whole. This figure masks the ethnic diversity within the “white” category. 17% are white but do not consider themselves British or Irish. This is by far the largest proportion of residents in the “other white” category of all the area committees. Country of Birth data (not disaggregated by ethnic group) indicates that there are significant numbers of people born in both Sweden and North America living in Barnes.

Three of the Output Areas (smallest area defined in the Census) have over 20% of residents which are from non-white ethnic groups. Numbers are very small at this level and it is therefore unwise to draw firm conclusions, however there are a larger than average proportion of Chinese people resident here.

Quick stats from the 2001 Census:

- A quarter of households do not have a car/van. Half have one car available to them. These figures are in line with the borough average.
- 61% of households are owner occupiers (including those buying with a mortgage), which is below the borough average of 69%. On Census Day 2001 15% of households rented their accommodation either from the Local Authority or a Housing Association/ Registered Social Landlord, significantly above the borough average (11.7%).
- Only 11% of residents aged 16-74 do not have any qualifications, compared with the borough average of 13.6%. Half of people in the same age group have reached the highest qualification level¹, which compares well to the borough average of 45%.
- 1,128 or 12% of people living in the area have a limiting long-term illness, of which 42% (470 people) are of working age (16-74 yrs). Both figures are similar to the borough average
- 78% of residents said their health was “good”, 17% that it was “fairly good” and only 5% that it was “not good”. These figures are significantly better than the England & Wales averages of 69%, 22.2% and 9.2% respectively).

Socio-economic classification



Barnes has a higher proportion of residents working in higher professional and managerial posts than the borough average. It has fewer people working in lower skilled jobs.

NS-SeC is the National Statistics Socio-Economic Classification providing an indication of socio-economic position, based on occupation.

Town centres

- Barnes is one of the borough’s largest local centres with over 70 shops.
- It has very low vacancy rates of approximately 3% (2004 Council Town Centre Land Use Survey).
- It has a successful farmers market.

Economic statistics

- Barnes’ unemployment rate² in January 2005 was 1.7%. The borough average was 1.8% which is the lowest of any London Borough - the London-wide average is 4.4%.

Using this measure of income, data suggest that income levels in Barnes are very high.

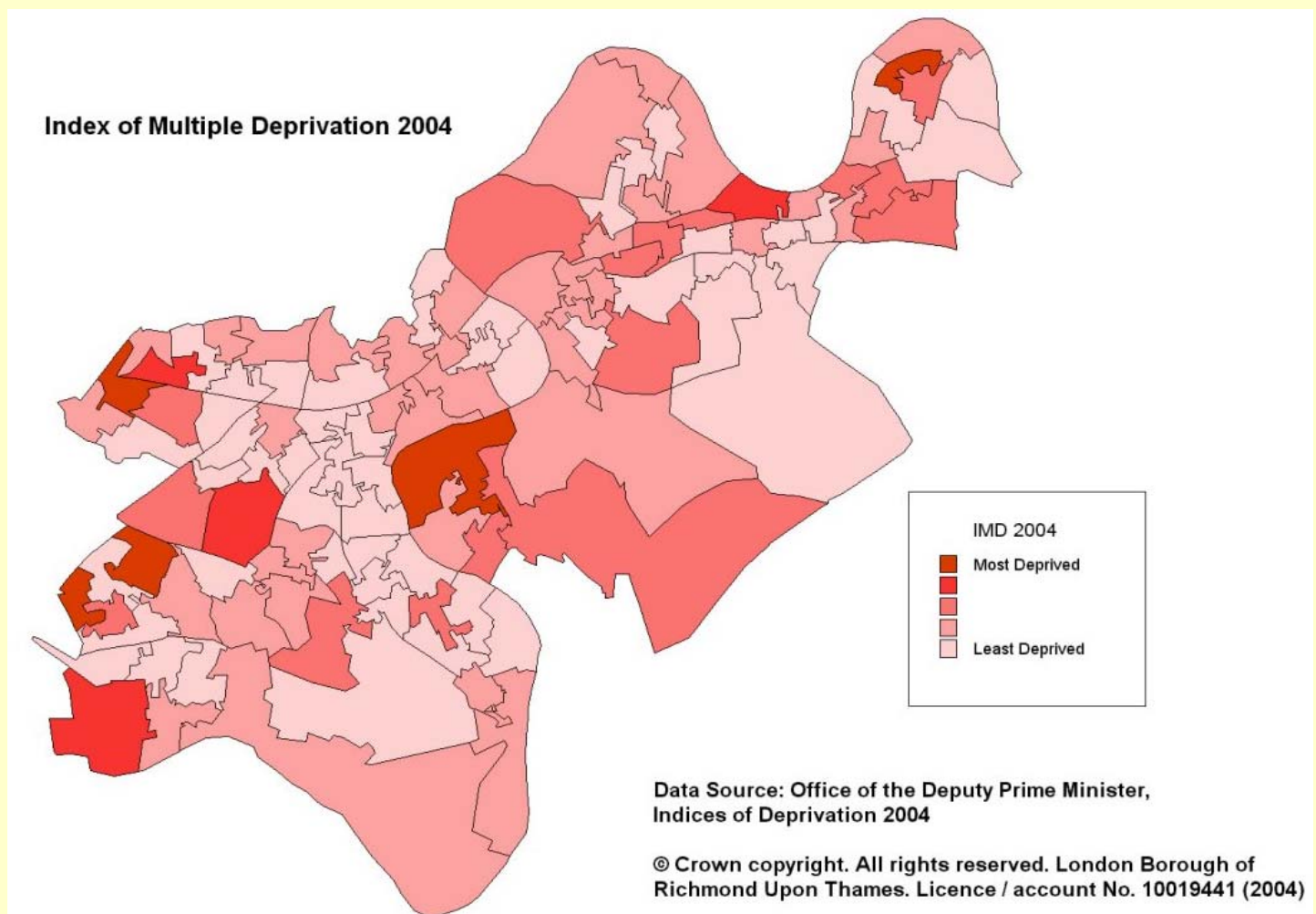
Richmond upon Thames has the 6th highest mean household income (£44,006) in 2004 amongst local authorities in Great Britain.

Deprivation

The ODPM's Index of Multiple Deprivation 2004 has been analysed at ward level by the GLA (excluding City of London). There are no Super Output Areas (SOAs) in the borough which fall within the 20% most deprived in the country.

Barnes does not have any Super Output Areas⁴ which are amongst the 30% most deprived in the country. Barnes ward is ranked the 551th highest (least deprived) out of the 624 wards in Greater London⁵.

The following map plots relative deprivation in the borough by SOA. Although not deprived in a national or regional sense, one SOA (dark shading) has the third highest score (most deprived) in the borough.
