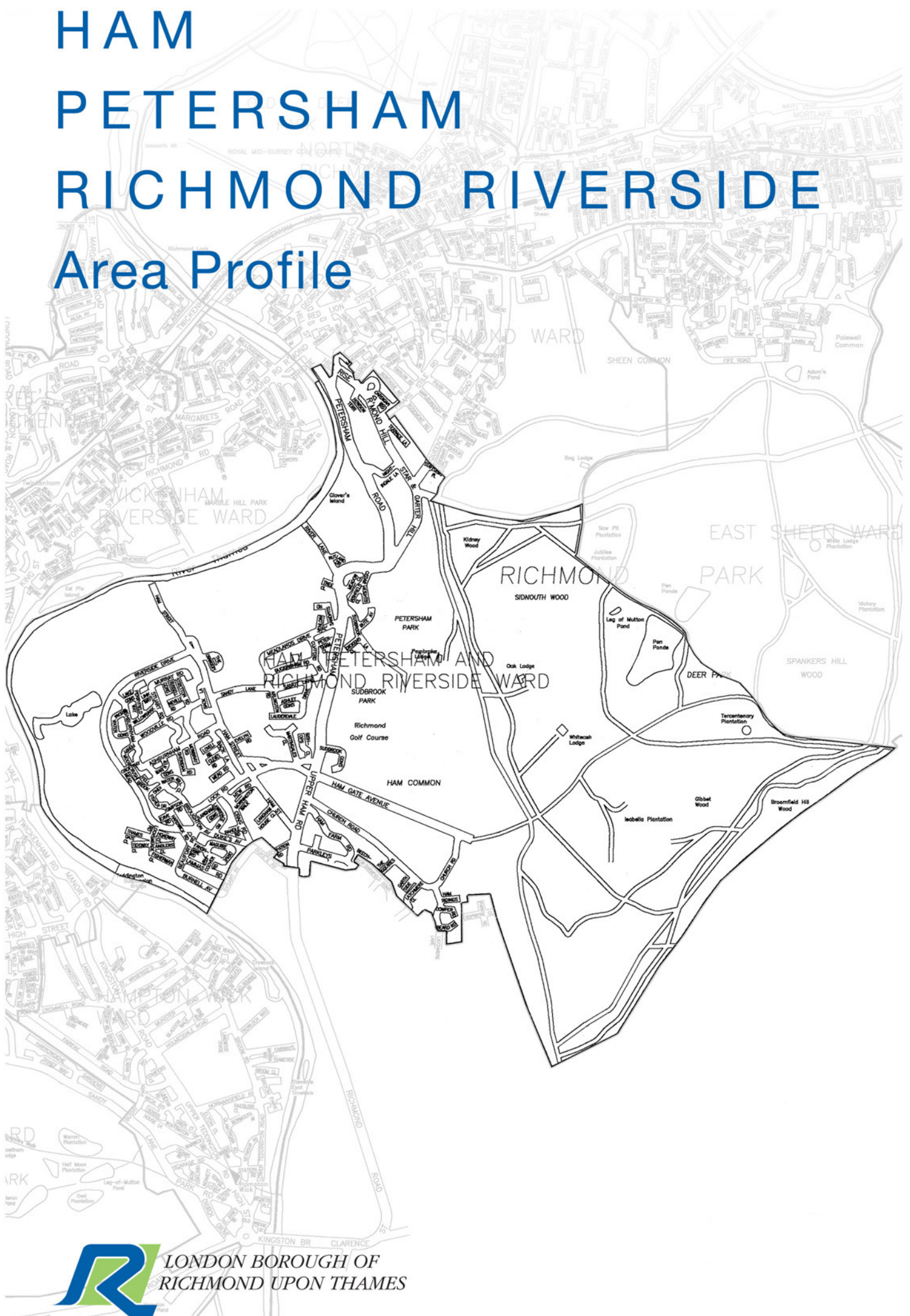

Household type

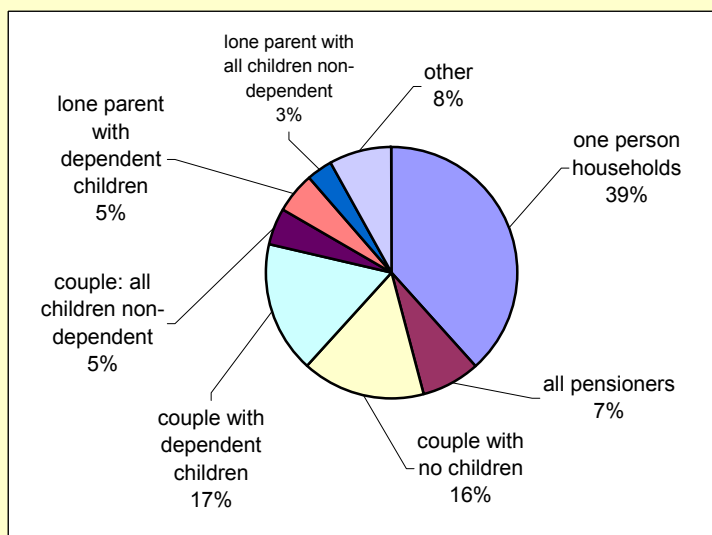
39% of households are one-person households. Within this category, just less than half are pensioners living alone, and represent 17.8% of all households. This proportion is significantly higher than the borough average (13.8%) (the highest of any ward) and the England & Wales average (14.4%).

It has the largest proportion of lone parent households both with dependent children (5.4%) of all the area committees, although on a ward basis Hampton North & Heathfield have higher percentages. It is still below the England & Wales average of (6.5%).

The average age of a resident in 2001 was 41.1, older than the borough average (38.1) and that for England & Wales (38.6). This area has the highest proportion (18.7%) of people aged over 65 of any of the Consultative Committee areas. Specifically, this ward has the highest proportion of those aged 75-84 (8%) of any ward in the borough. The proportion of those aged under 16 (17.7%) is below the national average (20.2%) and slightly below the borough average of 18.8%.

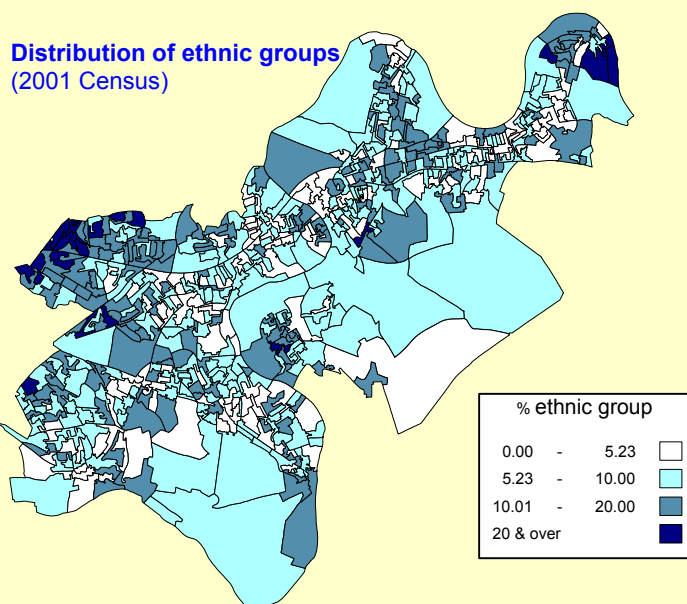
Estimates produced by the Greater London Authority suggest that the resident population is set to fall by approximately 3% by 2006. This makes it the only area where a decline in population is expected, & may well reflect the high proportion of older people living here.

According to the 2001 Census of Population there were 4256 households. GLA estimates (2003 round – Scenario 8.1) indicate that this figure is due to rise to 4,350 by 2006 despite there being an overall expected population decrease.



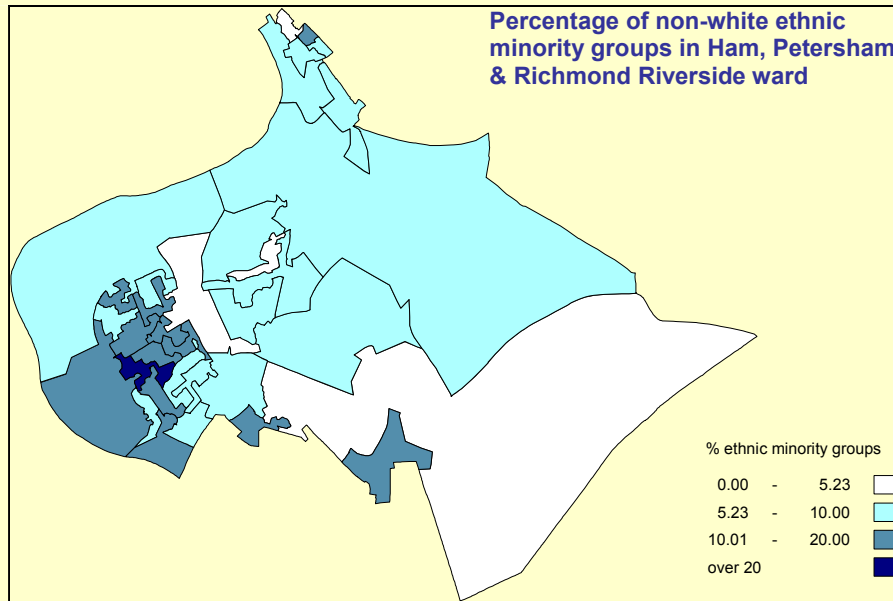

Just over 10% of residents are from non-white ethnic groups, which is only slightly higher than the borough as a whole (9.2%).



There does not appear to be a clustering of any specific ethnic group in this area at a ward level. However, one output area (the smallest area defined in the Census) identified on the map opposite in dark shading has a non-white population of 21%.

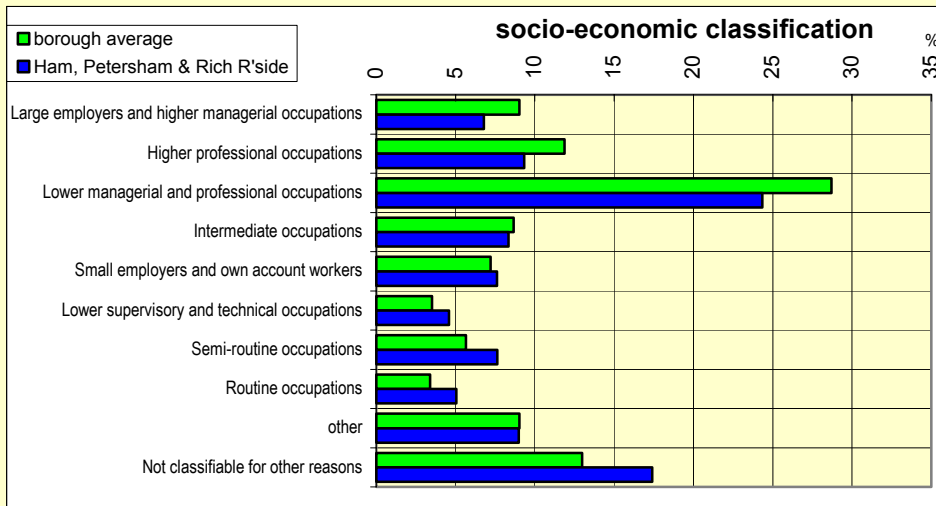

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Quick stats from the 2001 Census:

- 28% of households do not have a car/van, which is higher than the borough average of 24%. With the exception of North & South Richmond wards this is the highest of any ward in the borough, and is perhaps one of the least accessible areas in public transport terms. 48% of have one car/van - similar to the borough average (49.5%).
- 63% of households are owner occupiers (including those buying with a mortgage), which is below the borough average of 69%. On Census Day 2001 19% of households rented their accommodation either from the Local Authority or a Housing Association/ Registered Social Landlord, a proportion which is significantly higher than the borough average (12%). This area includes the Ham Estates.
- With the exception of Whitton & Heathfield, this area has the highest proportion (20.4%) of residents aged 16-74 who do not have any qualifications (borough average of 13.6%) However, this figure is still well below the England & Wales average of 29%. 38% of people in the same age group have attained the highest qualification level¹, which is well below the borough average of 45%, but again significantly higher than the England & Wales average of only 20%.
- 1,636 or 17% of people living in the area have a limiting long-term illness, of which 38% (626 people) are of working age (16-74 yrs). Although the proportion of people with a LLTI is significantly higher than the borough average of 12%, it is more in line with the England & Wales figure (18%).
- 71% of residents said their health was "good", 21% that it was "fairly good" and 8% that it was "not good". These figures are also more in line with the England & Wales average than the borough average.

The area has a lower proportion of residents classified in the group “higher professional and managerial occupations” than the borough average. More residents fall within the lower skilled & routine occupations categories (17.2%). However, this figure is still well below the England & Wales average of 27.9%.

NS-SeC is the National Statistics Socio-Economic Classification providing an indication of socio-economic position, based on occupation.

Economic statistics

- The unemployment rate² in January 2005 was 2.6% - the highest of any ward. The borough average was 1.8% which is the lowest of any London Borough - the London-wide average is 4.4%.

Richmond upon Thames had the 6th highest mean household income (£44,006) in 2004 amongst local authorities in Great Britain.

Using this measure of income, data suggest that income levels are low compared to the borough figure, but relatively high on a London-wide basis.

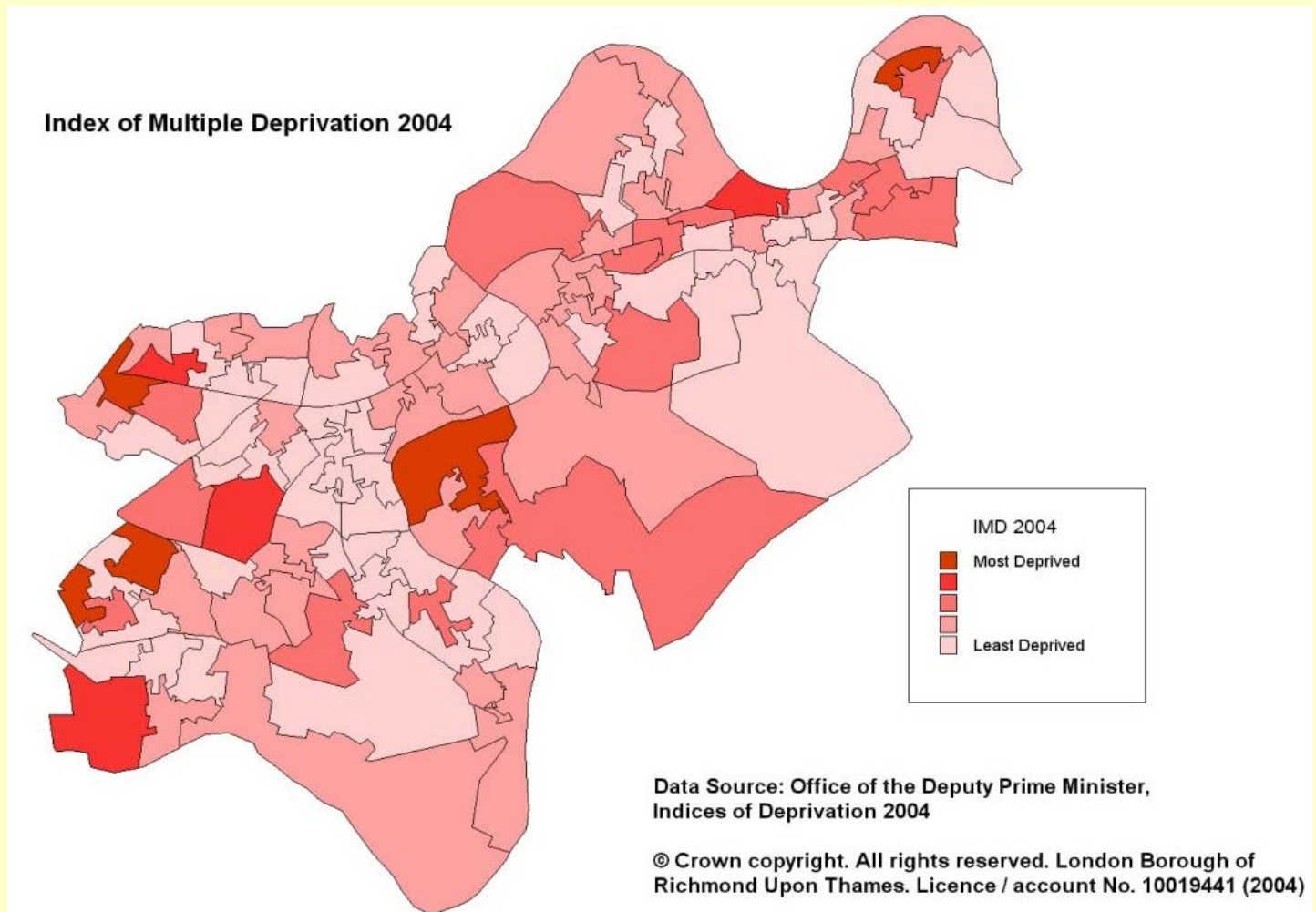

Deprivation

The ODPM's Index of Multiple Deprivation 2004 has been analysed at ward level by the GLA (excluding City of London).

Ham, Petersham & Richmond Riverside ward does not have any Super Output Areas⁴ which are amongst the 20% most deprived in the country. However, it does have one which is in the 30% most deprived category which can be identified on the map below (dark shading). Heathfield is the only other ward which also has an SOA in this category. This ward is ranked the 489 out of the 624 wards in Greater London, where 624 is the least deprived⁵.

Although not deprived in a national or regional sense, this ward contains areas which are amongst the most deprived in the borough. The following map plots relative deprivation in the borough by SOA.
