Through our three exhibition spaces, diverse range of arts festivals, award-winning education programmes, and cultural partnerships, the Richmond-upon-Thames Arts Service and Orleans House Gallery make the arts available to everyone.

We would like to thank everyone who has contributed to this project in various ways, including the consultation process, fundraising events and individual donations. We are still fundraising to meet our match funding target, and welcome donations and offers of help.

This year will mark the completion of the Phase 4 building work as part of the *Transforming Orleans House* project, supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund.

As a result of the building work, our main gallery space and Octagon Room will be closed until September 2017. This year due to the project the Twickenham Carnival will not be taking place, however it will return bigger and better in 2018. Our Stables and Riverside Galleries, as well as our education and festivals programmes, and North Stables Café will continue to operate, so we hope to see you at the Gallery soon!

The project will restore the architecturally important James Gibbs Octagon Room, and make the Richmond-upon-Thames Borough Art Collection more accessible through a new Study Gallery, picture store, training room, and increased interpretation around the site. Physical access will also be improved with a new entrance and lift access to the upper floors. This ambitious project will create a heritage hub for West London, connecting us to a number of sites across the borough and beyond.

A Collector's Lot: Richmond Borough Art Collection and its Creators
September 2017 – March 2018

The prestigious Richmond Borough Art Collection now comprises over 4,400 paintings, prints, drawings, photographs and objects spanning the early 18th century to the present day.

The collection has been created by a number of significant bequests and gifts. This exhibition explores the collections of people including Isabel Burton, Nellie Ionides, Leslie Paton, Raymond Gill, Arthur and Helen Grogan, Colin Smythe and others who have helped to create this fascinating collection.



Oi Nuen Sprunt and Sarah Hacking-Brian: Lose Your Mind
Until 5 February

Lose Your Mind is an exploratory journey through the mind, culminating in an installation and collaborative video with singer-songwriter Sarah Hacking-Brian, highlighting the everyday struggles of mental illness. The hope is that this artwork will help break the stigma surrounding these illnesses that affect so many with an overriding message of 'You are NOT alone'.

The work incorporates sumi-e (Japanese ink painting), copper and aluminum leaf, plaster, light, sound design and video, combining to create a rich and highly textural approach.

This project has teamed up with the charity Mind, which will benefit from the proceeds of artwork sales.

Martin Davison: Playing the Changes
9 February - 19 March

Martin grew up in Worcestershire and Pembrokeshire, the source of some of his reminiscent paintings, but has lived for almost 50 years in Mortlake, where he has his studio and workshop.

Davison enjoys being perpetually explorative and has spent his life making and inventing things: architectural models, furniture, sculpture, paintings and drawings, newly-invented toys and board games and fabric designs.

He has hopes that this exhibition might stimulate changes in the ways we look at the world. The works themselves show Davison's constantly changing techniques and styles, choices of multiple-mixed-media and subject matter – from a tiny agave seedpod to interstellar space. These works respond to the present moment rather than the past.



Eric Jiani
23 March - 7 May

Eric, who has Asperger's syndrome, describes himself as a self-taught, fantasy artist and says that his work is semi-autobiographical. Much of the imagery and inspiration that can be seen in his paintings are memories of his time living close to the Amazon rain-forest, in Brazil, where he grew up.

His work can be found in many private and public collections in Europe, South America and the United States.

"Ever since I was a child, I have always liked inventing my own imaginary world and then expressing these worlds through models, maps or drawings. It is from this basis that my art has developed, going through different phases. I now feel I am moving ever closer to finding my place in the real world."



Equine Idyll: Bethe Bronson & Laura Marker
11 May - 4 June

Orleans House has been lost to the passage of time, but once was an idyllic retreat, worlds away from the bustling city; a pastoral vision set beside the tranquil flowing river - horses and boats providing the main way in and out.

Equine Idyll is an exhibition inspired by archival dreamscape imagery relating to Orleans House and experimental low-tech moving-image technologies of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Immersive projections reminiscent of magic lantern shows will act as a gateway to an earlier century, the heyday of Orleans House, giving the impression that a lost world has momentarily been recovered.

An exhibition celebrating the talent of Richmond's artists!

This inspiring and diverse exhibition will showcase the work of local artists taking part in the borough's Art House Open Studios festival, providing a taste of what visitors can expect to see when Richmond's creative residents open their homes and studios to the public in June and July 2017 as part of this unique festival.


The Contemporary British Painting Prize

24 August - 22 October

The Contemporary British Painting Prize opens again in 2017 and is designed for all artists in the UK who are engaged in painting. The winner will receive a critical essay on their practice and a £2,000 purchase prize of their work which will then enter the Priseman Seabrook Collection of 21st Century British Painting.

Judges include Stephen Snoddy, Director, New Art Gallery, Walsall; Elena Dranichnikova, founder of the Moscow Art Collectors Group (MACS) and the Moscow School for Contemporary Art; Jessica Litherland, Senior Curator MAC Birmingham and Nicholas Usherwood, curator, art critic and editor of Galleries Magazine.


Katie Sollohub: Eternal Sunshine

26 October - 3 December

After her very successful residency at Turner's House (exhibited in the Stables Gallery in 2015), Katie Sollohub has been invited to work at Pope's Grotto and Strawberry Hill House in Twickenham and Normansfield Theatre in Teddington.

Eternal Sunshine will celebrate Sollohub's unique way of inhabiting, experiencing and translating interior spaces through her art. She will be responding to these highly-individual Richmond borough heritage sites with new work, primarily drawings and paintings.

The exhibition coincides with the reopening of Turner's House, the conservation of Pope's Grotto and a future Walpole exhibition at Strawberry Hill House.



Liquid to Solid: the mutability of glass

7 December - 21 January 2018

Glass is unique amongst materials - even when in its solid state, it can appear as if it were liquid.

In this show, glass collective Just Glass returns to The Stables Gallery with a new show of kiln-formed glass created by its members.

Using the transition of glass from solid to liquid and back to solid, they have created a fabulous range of decorative, functional and abstract forms, sculptural pieces and wall-hung panels which illustrate the many visual qualities of the material - from flowing to crystalline, translucent to opaque and liquid to solid.

Sumiko Okubo: A Poem of the Harvest
18 February

Japanese Artist Sumiko Okubo is inspired by the natural world, combined with a deep sense of the spiritual. She works not only in woodblock and etching, but also pastel or bronze sculpture. Okubo's art evokes a sense of timeless peace and tranquility. Initially trained in Tokyo followed by studies in London, her traditional Japanese style is imbued with the western influence she absorbed during her time in England. She regularly exhibits her prints and drawings, collectively titled 'Poems of Nature'.



Botanical Beauty: Botanical art open
25 February - 1 April

Botanical illustration is the art of depicting the form, colour and details of a plant species. Although scientifically accurate, studies are often artistic and aesthetically pleasing. This tradition of marrying art with science goes back to the 6th century when the first botanical illustrations were created. The heyday of botanical art was from the 17th to the 19th century. In recent years, there has been a renaissance in this genre. This open exhibition showcases contemporary British botanical illustrations in a variety of styles.



A Personal Portrait: Photography open
8 April - 13 May

Since photography was invented in the 19th century, portraiture has been an important and popular genre of this medium.

This open exhibition brings together work by photographers from across the UK exploring different approaches to the theme - from formal studio studies, photographs commemorating significant life events, candid shots of subjects snapped on the streets and self-portraits.



Susan Gibbons: Endangered and Disenchanted Animals
20 May - 24 June

This exhibition is an inspirational contemporary collection of paintings which highlight the suffering of animals.

Whilst painting St Francis of Assisi (patron saint of animals), Gibbons felt an overwhelming oneness with animals and their lives on this planet.

This perception is presented in the subject of these paintings, hopefully raising awareness and knowledge by exploring the plight of endangered and disenchanted animals.

In a perfect world, Gibbons hopes humans and animals can live together in harmony.

Ian Butcher's Amazing 3D Collages
1 July - 5 August

A totally unique approach to collage making. Images, manipulated to give high colour and interesting texture, are printed onto matt art paper, then skillfully cut and layered to create fascinating three-dimensional illusions.

What at first might appear to be just a simple two-dimensional picture suddenly reveals its complex in-depth structure.

Paul Stewart - River: the Life of the Arcadian Thames
12 August - 23 September

A new exhibition by award winning photographer Paul Stewart that records life along the Arcadian Thames.

Paul's study of the river includes a selection of work from the forthcoming new book *River: The Life of the Arcadian Thames*. His work includes images of the landscape, working life, play and the people who make the river special along this most magical stretch of the Thames.



A Collection of Paintings by Charles Mozley (1914-91)
30 September - 18 November

Charles Mozley was a Yorkshireman who studied Fine Art at Sheffield, then the Royal College of Art in London. He lived in the borough of Richmond for twenty years.

Mozley's early work is part of the English Romantic movement. During the Second World War, he worked in camouflage along with other artists, such as Edward Seago.

This retrospective exhibition brings together a collection of Mozley's oil paintings, watercolours and graphic work from before the Second World War until his death in 1991.



Tricks of the Light: Open exhibition
25 November - 13 January 2018

For centuries, artists have attempted to capture the effects of light - from the dramatic chiaroscuro works of 16th century artist Caravaggio, to the colourful, vibrant plein air oils of the 19th century French Impressionists.

This open exhibition brings together contemporary artists working in a range of media who examine and explore the interplay and effects of light in art.



The Borough Art Collection



The Richmond Borough Art Collection currently comprises 4,400 paintings, prints, drawings, photographs and objects dating from the early 18th century to the present day. These works are regularly displayed in the Orleans House Gallery temporary exhibitions programme.

From September 2017, Borough Art Collection artworks will be displayed near the Octagon Room with interpretation on the building's links to the Hanoverians, French royal family and benefactor Mrs. Nellie Ionides.

For the first time, Borough Art Collection works will also be on permanent public display on the first floor in both the Orleans House Gallery and the Wider Landscape display and the new Study Gallery which will present works in thematic displays

including Orleans House Through Time, People and Places, Sir Richard Burton, French Connections and Curiosities.

Also for the first time, the entire collection will be made publically accessible via a searchable database on our new gallery website.

Education

SCHOOLS



Our wide-ranging schools programme supports the delivery of the National Curriculum and encourages the use of the arts and local heritage sites as versatile resources for cross-curricular learning.

We offer art and history workshops based on current exhibitions, the Richmond Borough Art Collection and local heritage sites. All sessions include interactive tours and discussion, followed by creative practical activities such as print-making, sculpture and creative writing.

All sessions can be tailored for Early Years Foundation Stage, Key Stages 1-5 and special educational needs.

Outreach

Bespoke Workshops - All art and history gallery-based workshops can be adapted into outreach sessions delivered in schools. We design and deliver tailored sessions to support teaching in the classroom.

Artist-in-Residence - We work with professional artists who deliver high quality workshops in a range of different media. We can support your Arts week or help with your Artsmark accreditation.

Arts Award - As an Arts Award best practice centre, we can deliver projects at all levels (Discover and Explore, Bronze, Silver, Gold) as outreach or in our gallery workshop. Teachers

We offer a range of services, resources and events for teachers.

INSET - We deliver full and half day art and history sessions for Continuing Professional Development at Orleans House Gallery or in schools.

Teachers' Evenings - Free opportunities for teachers to join a private twilight exhibition tour and take part in a practical art session led by our Gallery Educators. Refreshments provided.

Schools Arts Forum - Our new forum will give teachers a chance to find out the latest news in arts and heritage, in addition to sharing ideas and resources of their own.

NEW Education Resources - Coming in 2017, cross-curricular resources to support teaching in the classroom.

Alternative Education

Orleans House Gallery runs alternative education provision for students outside of mainstream education. This may be because they are part of a home-school programme or due to behavioural, SEN, health or other issues. Students are able to work towards qualifications (GCSE Art and Design or Arts Award) in regular focused sessions, either in small groups or individually. Young people are guided by Artist Educators to learn a wide range of artistic skills and help them create exciting and effective sketchbooks/portfolios.

Young people will be able to build upon their skills and creative confidence, whilst accessing specialist equipment, materials, exhibitions and gallery collections.

Orleans House Gallery is a registered AQA Exam Centre.

Education

ART CLUBS AND HOLIDAY ACTIVITIES



Art Clubs - Our exciting weekly Art Clubs at Orleans House Gallery offer budding young artists the opportunity to be creative and experiment with a wide range of art materials and practical techniques. They are run by professional artists throughout term time.

After School Art Clubs - run on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays for ages 5 to 15.

Octagon Club - our Tuesday art club for young people with additional needs aged 11 to 17. Young people are offered the opportunity to work towards an Arts Award.

Workshops run throughout Easter, summer and Christmas holidays, in addition to half terms.

All ages
