## 1 MINUTES OF LAST MEETING

The minutes of the previous meeting held on 15 May 2018, were confirmed as a true record.

## 2 RESIDENT ISSUES

# (i) No Man's Land/Hedges

Residents raised the ongoing issue with trees and hedges along the fence. It is believed that this was included in the planning permission for the school build.

CP confirmed that he was following up with regards to Planning Conditions in light of the residents' concerns. However, no response had yet been received. CP reiterated that any breaches of the conditions are now the responsibility of the School/Academy.

MB made reference to the fact that at a number of recent meetings no representative from the School had attended, which was disappointing.

JD confirmed that the School have responsibility for the site and that TSC/LBRUT would work to improve actions where they could.

GP reiterated frustration that the School had not attended – CP stated that the Sports Department/Council would continue to request their attendance, but could not pressure them to attend.

Cllr Brown suggested that he may be able to encourage the school to attend.

# (ii) Hockey Balls

SH raised the issue of hockey balls clearing the fence and landing in residents gardens. A number of balls were presented at the meeting as evidence.

TM confirmed that there is an agreement with players and teams that the home team should knock up at the Melbourne Road end of the non-floodlit pitch, so that only players who had knowledge of the site used that end. It was suggested that warm-ups be done width-ways across the pitch. TM confirmed that options such as this would be investigated.

CP confirmed that the Sports Centre had been in touch with the Council's Health & Safety team regarding the fence. It had been confirmed that it was built within regulations. Cllr Brown suggested that the H&S team could possibly speak with the residents. CP to investigate this option with the H&S team.

## 1 EQUIPMENT AND FACILTITIES

New weekend soft play drop-in sessions started in September and were a big success in terms of attendances.

Sports hall lamps had been replaced.

There was an ongoing reactive maintenance log with Teddington School.

#### 2 STAFFING

New Full Time Duty Manager, Michael Bonsu, had joined the sports centre team.

## 3 HEALTH AND SAFETY

An ongoing review of all site risk assessments had been carried out.

## 4 PROGRAMMING

Increasing partnerships with locals clubs including, Teddington Rugby Club, Royal Canoe Club and St Marys University squash team.

## Junior Programme

The current programme is still performing well, including a range of activities.

A number of activities are run in partnership with local clubs to allow participants to progress.

- Karate we work with the Bu-sen in Twickenham, allowing our participants to take
  part in various grading and competitions across the year. With the chance to be
  selected to train at the Bu-sen.
- Gymnastics we work with the Richmond Gymnastics Association, so our gymnasts follow the British Gymnastics Award Scheme and also the RGA scheme. This also creates a pathway for talented gymnasts to be selected for RGA performance squads.
- Football we work with Brentford Football Club Community Sports Trust.
- Tennis courses run with Best Tennis.

## Adult Programme

The adult programme overall has shown a decrease in attendance and income, albeit very marginal.

# Holiday Programme

Since July 2011, we have had a Service Level Agreement with KOOSA Kids to provide holiday play-schemes at Teddington Sports Centre. KOOSA Kids will be using the facility during all school holidays again this year.
