# WINNER: GINNY SPITTLE

Ginny Spittle engaged and supported the community on her street in Mortlake during COVID-19.

Ginny ensured that vulnerable people had been buddied up with someone to assist them with shopping and delivering essential items, as well as organised activities to raise the spirits of her neighbours. On VE day, Ginny organised a socially distanced celebration with bunting and music along her whole street. Ginny has gone above and beyond to look out for vulnerable members of her local community and to bring people together during the pandemic.



# Highly Commended: Dom Palacio

This year our highly commended nominee is Dom Palacio from Richmond Rugby Club.

In addition to his work with the club, Dom set up a collection point outside of supermarkets and Richmond Rugby club during COVID-19 to source food and technology for a local charity delivering food parcels. Dom also volunteered to collect groceries and walk dogs for vulnerable members of his community. Dom inspired over fifty other local people to join him in his efforts.

# Community Group Of The Year


Groups that exemplify what can be done to make a difference when people work together.

### **WINNER:**

### RICHMOND UPON THAMES NEIGHBOURHOOD CARE GROUPS

This year's Community Group of the Year Award goes to all eight of the Richmond upon Thames Neighbourhood Care Groups.

These eight groups are FiSH Neighbourhood Care; Ham & Petersham SOS; Richmond Good Neighbours; Whitton Network; Hampton & Hampton Hill Voluntary Care; HANDS; Teddington & Hampton Wick Voluntary Care and Kew Neighbourhood Association. These groups saw significant increases in demand from older people shielding at home during the pandemic and all stepped up and delivered in response to the high demand. Their work has been a big part of the ongoing voluntary sector response to COVID-19 in the borough.



# Highly Commended: Tag Youth Club

Tag Youth Club for Disabled Young People is our highly commended nominee for Community Group of the Year. They are an independent charity that operates for fifty-two weeks a year to deliver a range of evening, weekend and holiday activities and residential trips for people with disabilities. Tag provides much needed support for children and young people with disabilities from the ages of 8 to 30 living in Richmond and the surrounding areas.

# Community Project of the Year

Projects that have improved our borough and its local communities – run by individuals, groups or voluntary organisations.

### WINNER: SPADE GARDENING PROJECT

This year's Community Project of the Year Award goes to the SPADE gardening project.

Ten dedicated and hardworking volunteers make up SPADE, which provides gardening services to vulnerable residents across Richmond who are unable to maintain their garden themselves or afford a gardener. Spade helps those who are disabled, housebound and lonely continue to enjoy their gardens and the wellbeing benefits that being outdoors in nature provides.





# Highly Commended: Sheddington

Sheddington is a community support group created by Dr Chris Manning which offers a wide range of activities for people in the community to come together and enjoy, from DIY to mindfulness. Sheddington has been selected as this category's highly commended for providing a space for different people with similar interests to come together that also compliments and signposts to other available services in the borough where possible.

- Jackie Haigh For setting up the Share & Care Collective this year which is a parent community led initiative to raise funds and set up weekly street food collections.
- Mark Jopling For leading the team that has worked to save Udney Park Playing Fields from speculative development.
- 3. **Kew Sews** Rosanda McGrath led this community effort by one hundred women in Kew to create and supply face masks and scrubs to hospitals and care homes during the pandemic.



# Business Contribution in the Community

Local businesses that have demonstrated commitment to their local area.

### WINNER: THE ANGEL & CROWN

This year's Business Contribution in the Community winner is the Angel & Crown pub in Twickenham.

They have been nominated for their work to provide free meals, tea, coffee, clothing and sleeping bags for vulnerable members of the community during the pandemic, operating as a takeaway service following social distancing measures. They also worked with the charity SPEAR to arrange accommodation for the homeless.



# Highly Commended: Richmond Rugby Club

Richmond Rugby Club have been selected as our Highly Commended for the Business of the Year award. The team at Richmond Rugby Club supplied free cooked meals to families in need, both during the summer school holidays and over half-term. They also supported vulnerable members in their local community by doing food shopping, picking up medicine and walking their dogs for them. They also plan to open their clubhouse and training pitches when COVID-19 guidance allows as a safe space for secondary school children.

- 1. **Kew Convenience Store** For offering to get people what they needed during the pandemic and dropping goods at the homes of people who had to self-isolate.
- 2. **Squires Stores** For offering free delivery to local people who could not leave their homes before and during the pandemic and getting residents the items they required.
- 3. **Meet and Deep Newsagents** For providing free food to those in need and making sure their store caters for the needs of local residents.



# Trustee of the Year

For a trustee of a group or charity who has gone above and beyond in their role.

### WINNER: ROBERT BOLLEN

Robert Bollen has been selected as our Trustee of the Year.

Robert joined HoTCA and HoTCA CIO as a trustee at a difficult time of transition, stepping up in response to the many new challenges that COVID-19 brought for trustees. Robert worked with other trustees to transfer the lease from the unincorporated charity to the incorporated one. Robert also created a business case for redundancy and worked to source an accountant and trustee treasurer.



### Highly Commended: Sue Howes

Sue Howes has been the chair of ETNA since 2015. Sue has been selected for her work alongside staff and trustees to bring the idea for a new community kitchen space for ETNA to life. Sue has been praised for her underlying belief in the importance of empowering communities.

- Simon Danciger For his work as the chair of trustees at the OSO Arts Centre and coordinating the volunteer effort at the centre over the course of the first lockdown.
- 2. Valerie Munro For her work as vice-chair of the Richmond Talking Newspaper, ensuring that the newspaper continued to be recorded onto memory sticks and delivered to people with visual impairment during the pandemic.
- 3. Claudine McCreadie For her work as trustee of Kew Neighbourhood Association since 2018, reviewing the way KNA operates and for bringing a fresh perspective.



# Young Person Achievement Award

Young people (under 18 years) who inspire and drive change in their communities.

### WINNER: GEORGE MUDERACK

This year's Young Person Achievement Award goes to 10-year-old George Muderack from The Vineyard School in Richmond.

George has cerebral palsy and has been working hard for the past few years to try and walk short distances using his walker. George was inspired by what Captain Tom did for the NHS and replicated his challenge in support of BBC Children in Need, raising over £6,700. George walked for a total of 31 minutes and 13 seconds- which is the longest he ever has.

# Highly Commended: The Kingston and Richmond Youth Council

The Kingston and Richmond Youth Council were selected for their work during lockdown on developing and coordinating the Richmond Youth Wellbeing Survey to young people in the borough. They designed the questionnaire to ensure it enabled young people to identify their concerns about the impact of COVID-19 on their lives and worked



in partnership with many different groups. The Youth Council worked tirelessly to promote the survey to schools and gathered the views of 483 young people.

# **Environmental Award**

For individuals, projects and groups specifically focused on tackling environmental issues.

### WINNER: IAN GEORGE ANDREWS

lan George Andrews has been selected as this year's winner for his work setting up and running the Hampton Hill WasteWatchers group for over ten years.

The group reports local fly tipping and picks up litter in the centre of Hampton Hill, as well as car parks and streets. The group consists of fifteen volunteers who litter pick on the first Saturday of each month. They have been accompanied by Councillors on several occasions.



### Highly Commended: Michael Hildesley

This year our highly commended nominee is Michael Hildesley. Michael is in his sixties and works to clear the common in Barnes, clearing rubbish and unwanted plants in the area. Michael is not part of a group but has inspired many others in the community to help with his efforts. Michael has taken it upon himself to look after the greenery and environment in Barnes to retain its natural beauty for other residents to enjoy.

- For their work bringing all people, including those from disadvantaged communities, in touch with nature in the borough.
- 2. **GoodGym Richmond** For their work overseeing and maintaining the three pigeons plot project along the riverside.



# **Outstanding Sporting Achievement**

Those whose efforts and achievements in sport vitalise communities, bring people together and support physical and mental wellbeing, or those who have achieved significant sporting success representing the borough.

### WINNER: RICHMOND PARKRUN

This year the Outstanding Sporting Achievement winner are the organisers of Richmond Parkrun.

When events were suspended due to COVID-19, the organisers encouraged members to log their own runs and have made plans to reinstate runs in a socially distanced safe way as soon as allowed. The best parkrun was organised weekly, prior to COVID-19, and brought local people of all ages and abilities together. Tail walkers were used to ensure nobody was left out.



# Highly Commended: Simon Griffiths

Simon Griffiths has been selected as this year's highly commended nominee for his work in setting up a Thames river outdoor swimming group in March 2020. Simon provided guidance to many people that wanted to try swimming in the Thames and showed them how to swim safely. He often accompanied them with his stand-up paddleboard and formed a WhatsApp group to make sure swimmers could form safety groups with each other. He lent people his equipment so that they could swim safely. Simon's swimming group has helped many local people look after their physical and mental wellbeing.

# Lifetime Achievement Award

Those who have shown a long-term commitment to voluntary work and have made a significant contribution to their communities over ten or more years.

### WINNER: HOWARD GREENWOOD

This year's Lifetime Achievement Award goes to 91-year-old Howard Greenwood for dedicating his adult life to community activities in Richmond.

Howard was Chairman and Music director of the Richmond Concert Society for over fifty- seven years, working to provide high standard concerts at affordable prices for residents. He also worked with the Arts Council Schools music trust as well as in a community partnership with the RFU. He was also a frequent judge at the May Day fairs on Richmond and Twickenham Green, and has encouraged many young children in the borough to take up musical instruments.

Sadly Howard has recently passed away and our thoughts are with his family and friends at this difficult time.
