1. Summary

Please summarise the key findings of the EINA.

- Dose of Nature (DoN) is a registered charity, which is supported by the Council through the Active Richmond Fund Grant, that promotes mental health by encouraging the engagement with the natural environment. They hire space from Pensford Field Environmental Trust (PEST) to deliver services to Richmond and Kingston residents.
- PEST have a 21 year lease from the Council who own the property Pensford Fields from 2007 to 2028. PEST operates from a cabin that it built in 2008 on an adjoining site and manages and maintains the adjoining fields. In addition, it hires out the cabin and fields.
- This EINA relates to Dose of Nature's proposal to expand its activities at Pensford Fields and to the proposal to effect the change of management of the fields and cabin.
- DoN supports people suffering from a wide range of mental health issues, including depression, anxiety, trauma, bereavement, addictions and long covid. Clients are referred to it directly by all GPs in Richmond and Kingston. It also takes referrals for young people aged 15 and over from several youth services, including the Mental Health in Schools Team, the Leaving Care Transitions Team, Tier 2 and 3 CAMHS teams, Achieving for Children, and Off the Record.
- It delivers preventive programmes and wellbeing workshops to hundreds of people, in small but diverse groups, including paramedics, firefighters, refugees, domestic abuse survivors, carers, young parents, children, families, students, older adults, GPs, teachers, charity leaders, and environmentalists.
- There are increased demand and prevalence of mental health support needs in the borough and nationally. The Council wishes to work with established organisations to

bring capacity into the mental health system, utilising one of Richmond's greatest assets, our natural green spaces.

- DoN received over 1,000 referrals In the first four years of operation (as per 2022-23 Annual Report from 70 GPs and a further 7 organisations providing mental health support to vulnerable adults and young people and states that it is currently unable to meet demand for clients in Richmond and its ability to grow is undermined by restrictions placed upon it by the PEST. Dons are currently only able to deliver services to around 300 vulnerable adults and 100 young people (aged 15+) a year. If the proposal goes ahead it is planned to expand the service delivery to better meet the referral demand.
- DoN has, over the last 2 years, tried to negotiate with the PEST for greater access but say
 that rather than access being increased it has been restricted. It has reached the point
 where the relationship between the groups has become strained and it has asked the
 Council to consider terminating the PEST lease and granting a new lease to DoN who
 believe that it would provide a better service to the community.
- In addition to the service expansion mentioned above, DoN also proposes to enhance Pensford Field to create a vibrant community space, where all local people, young and old, feel welcome at any time to enjoy a haven of wilderness in the middle of an urban space, meet others and engage in outdoor social activities whilst learning to protect it. Its intent is to expand wider community use of the field beyond mental health work and to a far greater extent than the current provision.

This EINA therefore looks at two populations

- The residents of Richmond and Kingston who may be referred by their GP for the current DoN services.
- The residents of the immediate local area who may use the space without a referral.
- Whilst information was provided on the total level of referrals, service user level data was
 not available, and therefore a breakdown of this data by the protected characteristics was
 also not available. Whilst this makes it challenging to assess the impact and extent of
 levels of over or under representation across different protected characteristics, the
 service provides preventative and wellbeing support to diverse groups.

Key Findings:

- The EINA has found that there is no evidence to suggest this proposal will result in a disproportionately negative impact on any particular protected characteristic.
- The proposal will bring a number of positive benefits across diverse groups requiring mental health support across all protected characteristics as well as the wider local community through providing a vibrant community space (see impacts for more detail). However, we will work with Dose of Nature to monitor use to see if any unanticipated negative impacts emerge and if necessary, put in place suitable mitigations.
