Reduction of 90 to 20 hours was proposed, with no staffing on Fri and Sat. Councillor's campaigning contributed to the Government u turn with the withdrawal of ticket office closures.</li> <li>Whitton Walk as part of White Ribbon awareness was a high-profile event including the Leader and the MP.</li> <li>Ward surgeries are the last Saturday of every month at Whitton Library where Councillors offer regular personal support.</li> <li>Speeding at the Nelson Rd junction with Hospital Bridge Rd has been addressed with a community road watch scheme. 38 speeders have been sent notices of speeding.</li> <li>Stevenson Bridge, leading to the Feltham Triangle Estate, has been resurfaced providing a safer bridge for the winter.</li> <li>The Safer Neighbourhood Team re-opened Murray Park Hall as their local base. The Police Liaison Group continues to welcome feedback on crime issues.</li> <li>Whitton High Street: the Whitton Business Association is working to improve the parking situation in the High Street to encourage local shopping.</li> <li>Project with Tesco, Sainsbury's, Superdrug, Lidl and Iceland for security wardens in the High Street.</li> <li>Improved recycling at Nelson Rd car park. O'Brien         <ul> <li>Kneller Gardens Pavilion upgraded, tennis court upgraded, and more trees planted.</li> <li>Police Liaison Group meet regularly, aware of anti-social behaviour on Kneller Road green space and the Safer Neighbourhood Team is following this up.</li> <li>Community ambassador scheme gaining momentum, hope to recruit volunteers for Glebe Gardens.</li> <li>Mega skip day in the New Year for collecting larger items.</li> <li>Bike hangers, there has been 41 requests for street bike hangers.</li> <li>Strong interest in vehicle crossovers in relation to creating a fairer system.</li> <li>Localised flooding due to blocked drains and gullies. There has been an increased cleaning regime, but there are still blockages. Request to residents to report any blockages they see.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Cllr. Theme 1	Discussion
Future of High streets/shopping parades	<b>Cllr. Sehra</b> : Great pride in Whitton High Street's success. One of the lowest shop vacancy rates in the Borough and now working with the Civic Pride Fund to improve shop fronts. Working with Whitton Business Association, Love Whitton, to keep engaged with business views and local shop owners. Working together on Whitton High Street to improve parking/traffic flow.
	<b>George, Heathfield</b> : Question in relation to parking. Whitton High Street is one of the few original 1930's style High Streets. The support from Council has been great including the York Stone pavements. But in relation to parking, the shop keepers are parking in the High St, blocking resident use of the High Street. The York Stone paving has only patches that have been cleaned.
	<b>Clir. Sehra</b> : In relation to parking issues, there are many different parking restrictions – 30min parking, 1 hour, 2 hours variations. Shop owners using the High Street is a topic that has been discussed with businesses. The

	parking enforcement team is patrolling the High Street to prevent abuse of car parking availability. Traffic flow is key, but it also needs to be easy to stop off to use local services. There will be improvements in due course
	<b>Clir Humprey</b> : There has been challenges for businesses since the CPZ was brought in. Businesses could no apply for permits in the CPZ which limited there parking even further. Need to request business parking in the future when the CPZ is reviewed. Cypress Avenue is dealing with displacement parking from the existing CPZ which may make them want to be included in future CPZ's.
	We are supportive of active travel and the 110 Bus coming via the High St is always busy and has further opened up the High Street. Safety for cyclist, and safe bike parking is equally important.
	<b>CIIr Wilson</b> : In relation to the York Stone cleaning, we need to have a regular schedule of when cleaning will take place so that Councillors can monitor the service level. <b>CIIrs. To action</b>
	<b>Deborah, Montrose Ave, Whitton</b> Who would sign off the cleaning of the pavement? The Waste and Recycling Department? the Director of Environment? They need to follow up on why the job was not completed.

Vehicle crossovers	<b>Cllr Juriansz</b> : This is a particular issue in West Twickenham. Guidelines were increased on crossovers to avoid the concreting of front gardens. Residents have complained that the new guidelines are too onerous and discourage legal crossovers. There is a review in progress which is going to committee next week. The guidelines will be amended to be fairer for crossovers, but still require permeable surfaces in gardens to avoid flash flooding.	
	Paul Tanner, Twinning Estate: Residents have made their own form of slopes which have blocked gutters.

Theme 4 Waste, recycling and street cleanliness	<ul> <li>Discussion</li> <li>CIIr O'Carroll: Fly tipping is a particular issue in the alley behind the High Street. Constantly reporting fly tipping on Feltham Triangle and High Street. But it is a complicated problem as ¼ of the alleys are private land which the Council has less enforcement rights over. CCTV has been put in to catch fly tippers. Recommend that residents take pictures of the fly tipping and send to Twitter LBRuT_help.</li> <li>CIIr Allen: The new Richmond app enables you to report easily via your phone, including fly tipping. ('Richmond Council' in app store – 'My Richmond' app)</li> <li>Simon, Heathfield, Nelson Rd What can the Council do in private areas in relation to fly tipping?</li> <li>CIIr O'Carroll: The Council is responsible for the pavement, but not private land, so their contractors cannot clear private areas. It is often businesses that are fly tipping and the council depot does investigate fly tipping collections to pursue prosecutions.</li> <li>Mike: There was an increase in fly tipping in the 'no mow' period of grass verges.</li> <li>CIIr Coombs: The plan is to create wildflower meadows on the verges, but this may take 2/3 years. Meanwhile the litter accumulated in the grass verges. Fortnightly street cleaners were tasked to clean verges.</li> <li>Steve, Nelson Rd: Street cleaning for Nelson Rd cleans outside the shops but not the service road/main road where rubbish/fly tipping has accumulated.</li> <li>CIIr Humphreys: After the date on the collection schedule, if the rubbish is not cleared report to the councillors. 	<b>Clir Coombs:</b> The traffic contract is currently being reviewed to see if the team could do additional duties.

Jon Evans, Police Liaison Group Chair: The Council needs to publicise that residents must use a
licensed waste carrier, as it is illegal to hand rubbish to non-licensed carriers. With non-licensed carriers
resident's items may be illegally dumped and resident will remain liable for this.
Simon, Heathfield: On the railway footbridge the leaves are not swept, and the trees create a lot of
mulch.
Cllr Coombs: Need to ensure Nelson Rd footbridge is included in the contract, as it is often missed.

Question 1	<b>George:</b> Question in relation to electric charging points. What is the roll out of chargers? Is there the possibility of a fast charger in the Whitton Library car park. Heard about trial run of gullies in the pavement to allow for cables from home chargers to the street for those without off street parking.
Response	CIIr Coombs:       Trial of gullies in street of terraced houses. In relation to electric charging points, residents were asked where they wanted EV points. They are being rolled out in these streets and in lampposts.         CIIr Humphreys:       There has been a rollout of reserved bays and charging machines in identified sites. Residents did identify library car park so potentially installed in next round. The lamppost chargers have been put in, but there have been many complaints about these and resistance from residents. The implementation of chargers is led by data of where electric car owners live; therefore, we need residents to register ownership of electric cars. <a href="https://www.richmond.gov.uk/services/roads">https://www.richmond.gov.uk/services/roads</a> and transport/vehicles/electric vehicles         George:       We need to support electric cars.       Lampposts are slow chargers, so that is why they are less popular.         CIIr Humphreys:       If there are high parking stresses in a street it is difficult to allocate an exclusive bay to an EV charger, which is the reason for lamppost chargers.         George:       It would be good to have communal chargers in Whitton Library car park, with maybe 3 fast chargers.         CIIr Coombs:       There are currently 420 charging points in the borough, and there are 524 new EV points planned.         George:       The quality of the catch up is significant, we need more fast chargers.

Question 2	<ul> <li>Resident: In relation to the question about how to improve high streets and hygiene, the Whitton High Street toilet facilities are continually under maintenance. We need proper toilet facilities across the borough and washing facilities.</li> <li>Clir Coombs: The public toilets in Whitton are constantly vandalised, therefore need constant maintenance. We no longer have attendants. We are relaunching the Community Toilet Scheme with traders and there will be labels in window for the scheme, so that residents can use the toilets without having to buy something. This is a common issue across the UK, but it is not a statutory requirement for a local authority. It is difficult to keep the hygiene standard that is required and avoid vandalism. The Community Toilet Scheme ensures the cleanliness of toilets.</li> <li>Clir Juriansz: The review of the Community Toilet Scheme was approved at the Environment Committee. There will be an interactive map on the website and community toilets will also be in certain libraries and parks. We will ensure new</li> </ul>
Response	<ul> <li>businesses are brought into the scheme to cover all of borough. The scheme is being invested in with a dedicated officer.</li> <li>Clir Sehra: Has been speaking to restaurants in Whitton about the Community Toilet Scheme. In relation to Whitton Library toilets, Continental Landscape has stated that they are instantly vandalised after they are repaired.</li> </ul>

	Mark, Whitton Community Centre: Whitton Community Centre is part of the Community Toilet Scheme.
Headline Topic: Leaf Clearance	
Question 3	Resident: Do the council street cleaning contractors have an obligation to clear leaves?
	<b>CIIr Coombs</b> : The contractors do wait until a reasonable amount of leaves have fallen to clear up on mass. The leaf fall has been later this year. A dedicated team will be going out after a heavy fall of leaves. <b>Resident</b> : In Staines Rd piles of leaves are left in the road which jams the drains and causes flooding. The contractors are not doing the task.
	<b>Clir Coombs</b> : Extra staff are employed during the leaf fall season.
Response	<b>CIIr Wilson</b> : Although using 'Fix My Street' app is helpful, Councillors are not notified directly, so please inform them as well of any missed street cleaning.
