
Cloud nine

At fifteen, Somadina and her twin Jayaike are still waiting for their magical gifts to materialise. While their peers gain powers like invisibility and super strength, the twins' long-delayed abilities arrive with god-like force that neither can control. When Somadina accidentally kills a boy, her community turns against her out of anger and fear. Then Jayaike is kidnapped by a mysterious entity, forcing Somading to confront the true nature of her power in order to save him. Enchanting and romantic, this story explores difference, destiny, and the unbreakable bonds of family.

From the author of *The Final Year*, this poetry collection is perfect for ages 11-16. Each poem stands alone, but the collection unfolds best when read from beginning to end—an immersive journey through the highs, lows, and sheer chaos of secondary school. From the scent of Lynx Africa in crowded corridors to the slammed doors of teenage frustration, this book captures it all: the awkwardness of parent-teacher evenings, the bafflement of career days, first crushes, mischievous pranks, and all the gloriously messy moments that are part of growing-up.

An exciting thriller set in a quiet British town. Kay has just come back to Longrove a year after her best friend and her aunt died. Not long after she arrives, she receives a message: figure out the identity of the sender or her murder will be on Monday. At first Kay thinks it's a joke, but when her cousin Nikki admits that she's been receiving notes too, Kay realises that the anonymous note sender is serious. Together she and Nikki must figure out who they're dealing with, before it's too late. Perfect for fans of A Good Girl's Guide to Murder and One of us is Lying.

After Nettle accidentally stumbles into the realm of the fae, she is desperate to return to her ailing Grandma. Desperate enough to strike a bargain with the fearsome Fae King... She must complete three seemingly simple tasks in order to earn her freedom but, in this perilous and bewildering land, nothing is as it appears. Charming stableboy Conor and enigmatic shadow Fae Ellion offer their help, but Nettle must stay sharp and outsmart the ancient as she battles for her freedom—and uncovers the truth of her own existence.

Summer, 1916: as the Battle of the Somme looms closer, Stephen and Danny—two boys burdened by duty and surrounded by danger—find themselves caught between survival and something even more precarious—their love for one another. 
Under a fire-red sky Geraldine McCaughrean






This feast of a life Cynthia So
